## A. Proposed Name of the Chapter

Internet Society (ISOC) Mauritania Chapter (ISOC Mauritania Chapter)

## B. Community of Interest the Chapter Will Serve

The ISOC Mauritania Chapter will serve the entire national Internet ecosystem, including:
